Brief description of project	There are unprecedented rates of migration to Europe, alongside increasing concerns around the role of migrants in vaccine-preventable disease outbreaks. Migrants may be under-immunised due to health-infrastructure in countries of origin, and restrictions on access to care in host countries. Evidence is needed on the vaccination status of diverse migrant populations in the UK and Europe, with a view to developing and piloting innovative strategies to improve vaccination coverage and promoting catch-up vaccination in newly arrived migrants, and informing NHS/UK and EU-wide policymaking in this area. The aims of this project are to generate evidence on vaccination status of migrants to the UK and Europe, and explore strategies to improve vaccination coverage by: 1) Aggregating and analysing multiple datasets on vaccination and vaccine-preventable diseases in migrants; 2) Collecting primary data on vaccination status, vaccine delivery, and uptake among migrants through a cross-sectional pilot study of an innovative catch-up vaccination tool in UK primary care; and 3) Examining service providers' and migrants' perceptions through a qualitative in-depth interview study exploring vaccination needs, barriers to care, and approaches to service delivery.
